What Parents Should Know

Call of Duty is an online multiplayer game where players communicate through voice and text chat while competing in team-based matches. Many children interact with strangers during gameplay.

Before Your Child Uses Call of Duty

- Decide if the game is appropriate based on your child's age and maturity
- Set expectations about online communication
- Review privacy and chat settings together

Shared Account Management

Call of Duty should not be used in secret. Parents should remain involved with friend lists, voice settings, and privacy controls. Regular check-ins help maintain safety.

Where to Find Key Safety Controls

Voice Chat

Settings → Audio / Voice Chat

- Disable voice chat with strangers
- Limit communication to friends only

Friend Requests

Settings → Social / Friends

- Restrict who can send requests
- Review friends list regularly

Privacy Controls

Settings → Account / Privacy

- Limit visibility and interactions

Menu names may change as platforms update. Review settings together regularly.

This Is Not Set-and-Forget
